The POW/MIA Scholarship Program has continued to flourish because everyone supports the program and its responsibility to those who have sacrificed so much for us. This year I had 18 Applications to review. I received 8 new Applications, 4 second year returnees, 4 third year returnees, and 2 for their 4th and Senior year . Thanks for the tremendous support throughout the year (especially from Cabane Nationale) I was able to Award 18 Scholarships, totaling \$19,800.00. Thank you everyone!!

The POW/MIA Committee Meeting met on Thursday afternoon to discuss where we did the right thing or sometimes the wrong thing. Corrections are hopefully being taken care of. POW/MIA Grande Directeurs need to be a part of our Newsletter updates. A Notion was passed to extend the eligibility for Application for a Scholarship. It is now available up GREAT-GREAT GRANDCHILDREN of verifiable POW/MIAs. Keep in mind that Trade and Business Schools are also eligible for these Scholarships.

This past year the POW/MIA Program opened an online capability to submit your Program hours, miles, and expenses. The spreadsheet is designed to list every entry and automatically computes the monetary values for each item. You are able to enter a often as you like ant the numbers compile everything for you. There is a drop down function that lists each Grande, so you can see at a glance what everyone is doing within the Program. This dropdown will make the Consolidated Report a matter of easily copying one line of numbers. I had 11 Grandes this past year submit their numbers in this manner. I hope everyone takes a look at this program to see how simple it is.. You can access this site by going to the Emblem Sales dropdown to the Programs. Go to the POW/ MIA Consolidated Report Form and select the OQR Code at the bottom.



The National Ritual Committee met September 19, at the 105th Promenade Nationale at the Kalahari Resorts and Convention Center in Sandusky. 40 Voyageurs were present representing 25 Grandes.

National Directeur Ritual Steve Bradley called the meeting to order with the Pledge



Minutes of the last Ritual meeting were suspended with a notion, a second and a vote.

Chef de Chemin de Fer Frank Campo entered. He stressed the importance of our Ritual and the Ritual work of all Voyageurs and the Ritual committee.

Old Business: A notion was made, seconded and approved to correct a typo in the Birthday Celebration.

New Business: Three new passwords were introduced. A notion was made, seconded and approved to keep last year's password.

A notion was made, seconded and approved to add a paragraph to the Ritual and Manual of Ceremonies regarding the Altar Cloth and visitors to a Promenade. In the Third Degree of a Wreck, following the Wrecking Chef's instructions to the P.Gs. this will be added.

"In the opening of a Promenade, the Aumonier places the Altar Cloth on the Altar which is in front of the Chef de Gare. If guests are invited into a Promenade, the Chef de Gare will instruct the Aumonier to remove the Altar Cloth. After the guests have been escorted from the room, the Chef de Gare will instruct the Aumonier to re-place the Altar Cloth on the Altar. In the closing of a Promenade, the Chef de Gare will instruct the Aumonier to remove the Altar Cloth."

A notion was made, seconded and approved to change the last paragraph in the Wrecking Chef's instructions concerning Prayer.

The new paragraph will read "During prayer, while standing, all Voyageurs except the Aumonier will place the Chapeau over their heart by inserting the right hand into the Chapeau, with the thumb on the outside. Following the prayer, all voyageurs will re-cover.

Regarding the Pow/MIA chair. A notion was made, seconded and approved to add to the Plan Of Voiture Promenade Room Instruction 2 is changed to "The Altar should be directly in front of (approximately 3-6 feet) the Chef de Gare. The official Altar Cloth, when spread over the Altar, faces the Chef de Train as does the

From the Grande du Arizona, Sous Directeur and Assistant for Hero of the Year, Ben Carrillo. Thank you all for your untiring efforts and due diligence with performing your assigned tasks. Every Grande should be submitting a nomination for EACH AWARD and those nominated & forwarded to Nationale should receive an award / plaque at the Locale and Grande levels even if not selected for the Nationale award, and with appropriate publicity. PR is necessary to promote our Great 40 & 8 Organization and to assist in achieving our membership goals.

Without further ado, I give you our 2024 Award Recipients and their Biographies.

VOYAGEUR OF THE YEAR

The Voyageur of the Year for 2024 is Voyageur James Sweeney from Voiture 1031, Grande du Texas.

Invited into La Société in March 1992 while stationed in Schweinfurt, Germany, Jim Sweeney became active immediately as Drapeau and a member of the Wrecking Crew of V-1524.

In 2000, Jim transferred to V-1261 in Kansas where he served as Grand Youth Sports Directeur, Grand Conducteur, Locale Garde de la Porte, Locale Lampiste and Locale Chef de Gare. Jim was recognized as Locale Chef de Gare of the Year in Kansas in 1999.

Jim transferred to V-1031 of Texas where he served as Locale Conducteur, Locale Commissaire Intendant, Locale Chef de Train and Locale Chef de Gare.

In 2023 Jim was elected as Grand Chef de Train du Texas and stepped up to run the Central States Prom when the Grand Chef was unable to attend.

Jim represents La Société at the Central Texas Area Veterans Advisory Committee which provides communications among area veterans organizations, to promote and coordinate activities of interest to the military and retired community and to cooperate with other civic and fraternal organizations.

Jim has donated many hours to Meals on Wheels and continues to do so.

Under his leadership, V-1031 has donated food to children in need through the Killeen Independent School District.

Jim worked tirelessly to regain the tax-exempt status for V-1031 after a previous Commissaire Intendant inadvertently allowed the exemption to slip into revocation.

Jim, along with a group of veteran volunteers, frequently gather to honor unaccompanied Veterans funerals at the Central Texas Cemetery.

Jim and members of V-1031 have brough back the Flag for First Graders Program in their area, visiting 14 schools and distributing over 1100 flags in the Killeen area.

Jim, thank you for all you do for La Société. May I present to you the Nationale Voyageur of the Year for 2024, James Sweeney of the Grande du Texas.

HERO OF THE YEAR

John is an Army veteran, assigned to B Btry 2/147FA in Aberdeen, SD from 1997 to 2006. He was deployed to OIF2 in 2003 as the Rear Detachment NCO. He entered the South Dakota Highway Patrol Academy, graduating in 2006 becoming a State Trooper. John has been employed with the SD Highway Patrol for 24 years.

John was awarded the District 1 DUI Apprehension Award in 2008 and the Criminal Interdiction Award in 2010. He also received the VFW Post 17 Gold Star Award in 2018 and the Superintendent's Award for Bravery in 2024.

Additionally, John has been a Drug Recognition Expert, Field Training Officer, Forensic Mapper, Assistant Squad Leader, Motor Carrier Trooper, Crash Reconstructionist, Unmanned Aircraft System Pilot and District Crash Coordinator. He has attended over 1,000 hours of advanced crash reconstruction training and has investigated over 100 fatal crashes. John instructs crash investigation courses to agencies across the state.

On August 8, 2023, John was on duty working on patrol at the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally. John observed and then assisted a motorist attempting to jump start his vehicle. John quickly realized something was not right with one of the subjects and he was able to get a Good Samaritan, who was assisting Fluty, away from him and to safety. As John worked through the encounter, Fluty was uncooperative, failed to identify himself, and was displaying a sovereign citizen type demeanor. By the time Dispatch had confirmed the vehicle and several weapons inside were stolen from Rawlings, Wyoming, Fluty had fled into the woods and the several hours search for him was unsuccessful. Fluty was involved in an armed robbery / shooting incident in Rapids City the day before.

The following day, Trooper John was again on patrol at the rally. Around 1000, John observed Fluty and immediately confronted him. Knowing Fluty was armed and there were approx. 100 people at the "Big "D" gas station across the street, John flanked Fluty to the east in an attempt to keep the public safe so Fluty could not run into the crowd with a weapon. Fluty produced a gun from his waistband and fired at Trooper John who was able to avoid getting hit. Fluty ran towards Trooper John's car in an attempt to steal it but John's Tremco device was active so Fluty would be unable to get the car into gear. Trooper John took cover and engaged Fluty, firing his duty weapon along with an off-duty Minnesota deputy sheriff who came to his aid. Fluty was struck several times, ultimately surrendered and was taken into custody.

Fluty admitted to Attempted First Degree Murder (Law Enforcement) and Commission of a Felony While Armed with a Firearm. He faced 75 years in prison and was ultimately sentenced to 54 years a few days ago in Mead County Circuit Court.

May I present Trooper John Berndt of the South Dakota Highway Patrol, the 40&8 Societies' Nationale Hero of the Year for 2024.

CITY / TOWN OF THE YEAR

City of the Year is Anaheim from the Grande du California. Anaheim's support for Veterans extends to Online Veteran Resources allowing active-duty personnel, Veterans and their families to receive information about current programs and promotions in Anaheim. Understanding the challenge of returning to the civilian workforce, the Anaheim Workforce Connection gives priority services to Veterans seeking employment. The city website promotes job fairs, both in and near the city, to improve their citizens' employment prospects.

Housing in Southern California is expensive, and the major effect is homelessness. The Anaheim Housing Authority gives preference to Veterans when assigning housing vouchers for those who live or work in the city of Anaheim. Vouchers are offered to assist Veteran families where rent is over 30% of their income. They also provide information on several state and non-profit programs which offer housing assistance, home loan programs and shelter programs. Discounts of 10% - 12% on utilities can be applied to Veterans. Assistance comes in several forms, which makes Anaheim a Veteran-friendly community.

As an expression of the city's gratitude to Anaheim's Veterans and active-duty members, banners honoring their service are flown on light poles throughout the city. They also have special banners and a webpage honoring fallen heroes to assure their sacrifice is not forgotten.

Raising awareness of Veterans within the community, Anaheim pays tribute to their veteran residents with ceremonies honoring veterans. Anaheim was designated as a Purple Heart City in 2014. Ceremonies honoring veterans are hosted by the city including Memorial Day, Fourth of July,

Flag Day and Veterans Day. This is in stark contrast to surrounding cities who have been eliminating their city-hosted ceremonies.

Active-duty support is provided by the City of Anaheim Marine Adoption Committee. They provide community support through private donations for the Marines of the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit (MEU). The committee has been helping Marines and Sailors since 2007.

The city of Anaheim will soon add another accolade as the Home of the Southern California State Veterans Cemetery, continuing their long tradition of supporting veterans and honoring their service, with a prospective site along the State Route 91 Freeway in the city.

Unfortunately, the Mayor of Anaheim, Ashleigh Aitken was unable to attend Prom. The 40&8 Society thanks the city's leaders for your support for your local veterans. May I present the 40&8 Society's City of the Year for 2024, Anaheim, California.

LAW OFFICER OF THE YEAR

The Law Officer of the Year for 2024 is Patrol Officer Peter Eberling of the Bolingbrook Police Department of the Grande du Illinois.

On August 20, 2023, officers were dispatched to the 100 block of South Bolingbrook Drive for the report of shots fired. While headed to the scene, officers learned the offender had committed a retail theft, and after being confronted, shot at the business with an unknown type of firearm.

Officer Eberling located the suspect and attempted to make contact. The suspect ran toward a residence with Officer Eberling pursuing, while giving verbal commands for the suspect to stop and lay down on the ground. The suspect ran into a residence in the 100 block of Briarcliff Road. Officer Eberling then observed the suspect reappear with a handgun and the suspect began shooting at Officer Eberling, striking him in the abdomen and the leg. Officer Eberling returned fire, and although shot and bleeding, maintained sight of the suspect, and relayed information to dispatch of what had occurred. Fellow officers arrived to assist and transported him to the hospital for treatment of his injuries. The offender was later placed into custody following a standoff at the residence.

Officer Eberling was treated and released from the hospital a few days later. The release from the hospital was only the beginning for Officer Eberling. The hard part was beginning the physical and emotional recovery from this traumatic incident.

In just six short months, Officer Eberling returned to full duty. His determination to return to full duty was nothing short of astounding and his determination is a model for all to follow.

Officer Eberling received the Bolingbrook Police Department Medal of Valor for his actions during this incident. Officer Eberling was awarded the Bolingbrook Police Department Purple Heart for injuries sustained in the line of duty. Officer Eberling was selected by his peers as the Police Officer of the Year for 2023. His actions were consistent with the best traditions of law enforcement and the Bolingbrook Police Department.

Our National Law Enforcement Officer of the Year for 2024 is Officer Peter Eberling of the Bolingbrook Police Department from the Grande du Illinois.

Good evening. Voyageurs Militaire!

First, let me say how much I enjoyed seeing everyone at the Promenade Nationale in Sandusky OH. Looking forward to seeing you all and even more of you for the next two years in Gettysburg PA.

I want to express my gratitude to Passe Chefs de Chemin de Fer Frank Kronen, John Digilio, Ted Lang, and Frank Campo for being so supportive of my efforts to speak about PTSD and suicide prevention. I also would like to thank the new Chef de Chemin de Fer Paul Emmert and Correspondant Nationale Ron Rolfes for their faith in me. Last but certainly not least, I need to thank my mentor, Passe Grand Chef du NY Wayne Sorrentino for guiding my path and encouraging it in our Société.

I stated in that live presentation, and I will restate it here: what people do not realize about PTSD is that it goes far beyond terrible memories, sleep loss, nightmares, anger, hypervigilance, anxiety, depression and all the other telltale symptoms. It has been found, thanks to sophisticated neuroimaging techniques, that the biochemistry and physiology of the brain changes with the repeated adrenaline blasts experienced during combat, irregular sleep and sleep deprivation, low quality nutrition, deafening noise, and blinding explosions. This is to say that a person comes out of their service with changes to their brain that are not due to normal development and maturing. As many of you have heard me say elsewhere, so many go into the service as "Person A" and come out the other end of their service as "Person B" And is it any wonder? I believe one of the major contributing factors to this personality change is the change in brain chemistry and physiology.

What many people are also not aware of is that life gets more and more difficult for Veterans as they become more and more aware of their symptoms. But there is hope. I need to point out that the diagnosis of PTSD does not need to define a Veteran's life, and as much as I dislike the term 'manage', it is possible to manage PTSD symptoms.

By 'management', I'm talking about any combination of psychotherapy, medications, hobbies like artwork or horseback riding, meditation or anything else that works. When it comes to recovery and healing, unfortunately one size does not fit all. Veterans have to engage in a creative process to figure out what works for them. I help facilitate this every day in my consulting room.

Let me reiterate something else that I said in my talk in Sandusky OH: let's make talking about mental health the norm, instead of the exception, Because the longer it stays the exception and we don't talk about it, the longer suicide will continue to amass its body count. I steadfastly maintain that this can be avoided with the following sentiment:

"Open your mouth, and the pain comes out."

As I write this, the 2024 presidential election is approaching. In 2000, 59.5% of those registered chose to vote in the presidential election. In 2020 the percentage voting rose to about two -thirds of those eligible or 66.8%, meaning this important privilege of U.S.



citizenship was not exercised by one-third of our population.

In his book Alone No Longer, Stanley Stein notes that upon his arrival at the Carville leprosarium (US Public Health Hospital) one of the first things he noted

was the patients' love for talking politics. Long before they achieved the right to vote, in 1932 patients "voted" by straw ballot with 344 of 367 patients participating, choosing Roosevelt over Hoover.

At least one patriotic and passionate patient was so determined to vote that for five consecutive Novembers he escaped Carville through a hole in the fence to "exercise his franchise at some mysterious precinct" where he met voter requirements. Upon return to Carville, he paid the price for absconding and spent up to 120 days in the Carville jail.

In 1934 the American Legion began its support to grant Carville patients the right to register and vote. After years of lengthy debate, in 1946 a constitutional amendment and an enabling act passed both houses of the Louisiana legislature. Earliest Carville registration rolls contained 133 names. (Many eligibles could not register because they would not give their "true" names, choosing to remain anonymous.) On 20 January 1948 Carville's patients for the first time exercised their right to vote in an election (a gubernatorial election).

Your Carville Star Committee recently voted to approve our program project for 2024-2025. This project will have a great impact on the day-to-day operation of the National Hansen's Disease Museum at Carville. With your help. we intend to purchase a security system that will represent a significant upgrade from the museum's existing capability. We will be seeking your donations for this project and as true for past projects we will rely on your generosity.

For a little while now, I have been debating on what to write this article about. For quite some time we have been talking about the expected shortage of nurses in the near future. And there has been much written on our need to continue to support nursing students through locale, grand, and national scholarship

programs. I would like to talk about the Boland Trust scholarship program in this article. There was a discussion at the last Nurses Training committee meeting in Ohio, about creating another national scholarship within the Nurses Training Program, I am not a supporter of

that idea because we are not utilizing the national scholarship

program that we have in place currently. That being the Boland

Trust Fund. I would like to take this opportunity to fully endorse the Boland Trust Fund and ask for your support and utilization of that fund to support our nursing students with scholarships. We have the capital available; the problem is applications for the scholarship are not being requested.

The Boland Trust Fund offers four different scholarships. (1) the traditional scholarship options, (2) the limited scholarship option, (3) the advanced degree program scholarship, (4) and the At-large scholarship option. All the information needed to apply for any of these scholarships can be found on the Forty and Eight website. All four of these scholarships are so very easy to obtain if the applicant meets the criteria. It took me

about an hour worth of work to get a young lady \$ 1,500 dollars to help with the cost of her education. One of the main things I would like to see this year is that we are giving back to our communities at the national level as well as the grand and locale levels. The steps to attain a scholarship are very simple. Call or email Terri Taylor and request an application. Give it to the student to first complete their portion, have them take it to the school to complete their portion. The student then returns it to you. Have the Chef and the Correspondant sign it and return it too National and that's it!

I would love to have a record setting year on the number of scholarships given in a single year. Ensuring that every student in the nursing field in need of financial assistance is aware of the opportunities we offer is my goal. And to reach that goal I need every member of our organization to go online learn about the Boland Trust Fund and what they have to offer, then use it at your Locale and Grande levels. We donate thousands of dollars each year to the Boland Trust Fund. That money is generated from donations and the sale of the Nurses Training pins, we must show the supporters of this program that those funds are getting back to our communities. The Boland Trust committee members can only work with the applications they receive, and they simply are not receiving applications. So, I would like to see every grand that has a nurses training program in place be able to report that they received at least one Boland Trust scholarship this year.



News From the Department of Veteran's Affairs

From the desk of Ron Rolfes Correspondant Nationale

October 23 thru 25, 2024 I found myself in Washington, D.C. attending the VA Voluntary Service National Advisory Committee "Executive Committee" Meeting. For the past, several years our October meeting has been in D. C. with the hopes of meeting with the VA Secretary or at least one of the "Top Three." This year we met with Margaret "Meg" Kabat, VA Chief of Staff.

Ms. Kabat, a licensed clinical social worker, bringing more than 25 years of service to Veterans, their families, caregivers, and survivors. She covered several topics during her presentation and here are a few.


Caregiver Support has grown by leaps and bounds. There are now over 50,000 enrolled and the program continues to grow. The biggest problem seen thus far is determining what classifies as a caregiver. Meaning how much support to a Veteran qualifies as "caregiver support." It seems to vary from station to station. They are working to standardize the program across the country, and they are qualifying more and more caregivers each day.

She also discussed Veteran Homelessness, which if you know anything about the VA Secretary, which is one of his 5 key initiatives, to end Veteran Homelessness.

Although she did throw some figures out, what caught my attention the most was she discussed the "functional zero

homelessness." Functional zero is a service system that must be able to provide permanent housing to everyone depending on it to secure such housing. Some of the cities that have reached functional zero are New Orleans, Houston, and Las Vegas. VA continues to work towards functional zero across the country.

She mentioned the fact that our VA facilities could not operate at the standards they do today without the dedicated Volunteers in our facilities. There were over 27,000 Regularly Scheduled (RS) Volunteers that provided 3,495,259.43 volunteer hours. Also recorded were 76,516 Occasional Volunteers with 312,179.04 hours for a total of 3,807,438.47 Volunteer Hours. After her presentation she took several questions from the committee. I asked a question to her regarding the fact that we were going to see a



There were our standard updates by all the subcommittees, and we had a few other guests come in as well. One speaker of note was Ms. Kimber Parry, Population Scientist, VHA Office of Rural Health Veterans Rural Health Resource Center, Salt Lake City. Her topic was the Rural WAVE Initiative. WAVE short for Wellness and Veteran Engagement focuses on strengthening interpersonal connections, renewing a sense of purpose and mission, and improving overall quality of life for Veterans and their families. Rural WAVE strives to be inclusive and focuses on rural Veterans, but also encourages families and civilians interested in supporting Veterans to participate in community reintegration. She stated that in order for a facility to qualify, fifty percent of the Veterans needed to be rural. We also learned that her office was looking at ways to collaborate with DAV or whomever to standardize the onboarding of transportation drivers. The NAC Recommendations subcommittee is currently in the process of writing another recommendation regarding that very topic. All in all, an interesting brief. 


